It is that time of the year again—time to nominate and elect Deacons! You'll notice that the Deacon nomination form has been included in this week's Illuminator. I would encourage everyone to take some time to think and pray about who you would like to nominate to serve as a Deacon here at Hope Valley. Consider the people you know at our church and how their gifts line up with the mission of the Deacon Board—to provide pastoral care and leadership to the members of our church.

At its best, church is about all of us coming together to care for one another, walk alongside each other, pray for each other, and build community together. Church is never about any one person doing everything. It has always been and should always be a collaboration among all of us. We see several places throughout the scripture where various leaders of our faith realize they cannot go it alone. Jethro encourages Moses to appoint judges (Exodus 18:13-23). The apostle realize they need help in order to preach the gospel and take care of the people (Acts 6:1-6). In his various letters, Paul makes mention of deacons serving the people of the church faithfully, with perhaps the most famous one being Phoebe in Cenchreae (Romans 16:1-2). These leaders of our faith looked to others as partners as they sought to faithfully follow God's will.

That is the primary function of the Deacons—to partner with the Pastor and other leaders within the church to care for our congregation and help us faithfully follow God's will. If you know of someone who you think would do a good job leading and serving in this way, I would encourage you to speak to them, tell them the gifts you see in them, and see if they would be willing to be nominated for a position as a Deacon. Or if you yourself feel God calling you to step into this leadership role, I would encourage you to speak to another church member about that and see if they would be willing to nominate you. As always, I would counsel everyone to listen for God's voice in this process and seek to follow God's will.

The Personnel Team is pleased that two staff positions have been filled on a temporary basis.

Amy Herring has agreed to work as Interim Minister to Children and Families effective August 8. Amy will work 8-10 hours per week and will focus primarily on children's Sunday worship and a few special activities with a family focus. Our agreement is for three months or until the permanent position is filled, whichever comes first. The agreement can be extended if the permanent position has not been filled at the end of the initial period.

Kathryn Bunch has agreed to return to the interim Director of Music Ministries position effective September 1 for as long as needed. She will work 15-18 hours per week. We have temporarily suspended the search for a permanent Director of Music Ministries but will continue to look for a permanent pianist.

The Personnel Team will sponsor a series of Town Hall Meetings in August and September to get input on how to best meet the needs of children, youth and families at HVBC. The Minister to Children and Families and the Youth Director/Intern positions are both currently vacant. The Director of Music Ministries works for 15-18 hours per week and the Youth Director/Intern for 8-10 hours per week. In recent years, the Youth Director/Intern has been a Duke Divinity School student.

Anyone can save the life of a person experiencing sudden cardiac arrest using equipment available at Hope Valley Baptist Church.

Two Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) were donated to Hope Valley about a decade ago by Linda and Emmett Ward. Originally these devices were available only in medical settings, but the technology has now improved to the point that they can be used successfully by people with little or no training.

"There was a push to get them in places where people tend to gather — hotels, ballparks, stadiums," Linda said. "Because of the gymnasium and particularly the age of our members, we felt like the church was an ideal location."

The American Heart Association website describes an AED as an electronic medical device that automatically checks a person's heart and administers a shock when needed to restore the heart's rhythm. Research supported by the National Institutes of Health estimated in 2018 that more than 1,700 lives are saved each year in the US by bystanders who use an AED during a cardiac emergency.

At Hope Valley, one AED is located at the gym-side entrance to the children's Sunday school wing in the main building, and the other is near the downstairs restrooms in the Family Life Center. The AEDs are stored in unlocked glass cases. You do not need special permission or training to use. If there is a medical emergency, open the case and remove the AED. An alarm will sound, but this is just to alert others that an emergency is occurring. When you open the AED, it turns on automatically and provides step-by-step instructions for use.

Even with an AED, you should call 911 and, if the patient is unresponsive, start chest compressions. The combination of CPR and an AED can buy a patient valuable time until emergency services arrive.

"In case of a heart-related emergency, time is of the essence," said Frances Smith, a retired paramedic and American Heart Association instructor. "It is far better to have the AED with you than to have to go back and get it in the midst of the emergency."
